The plan of action chalked out by the IQAC in the beginning of the year towards quality enhancement and the outcome achieved by the end of the year *

Plan of Action

- As per the recommendation by the peer committee, it was proposed to make infrastructural modification for the benefit of physically disabled students.
- As per the recommendation by the peer committee, it was proposed to strengthen Carrier guidance and placement cell.
- It was proposed to start diploma course in French Language
- It was proposed to conduct add on course on dramatics.
- It was proposed to conduct Sanskrit language speaking course.
- It was proposed to establish MOU linkage with institutions like Charted Accountants Association and District Chamber of Commerce and conduct training programs for CA/ICWA aspirant students.
- It was proposed to take up technology up gradation measures.
- It was proposed to strengthen Women Empowerment Cell "Spandana" by conducting counselling and orientation programs for girl students
- It was proposed to conduct workshops and seminars for teachers and non-teaching staff to enhance and sustain their academic standards, encourage teachers to attend state level and national level seminars and workshops, refresher and orientation courses.
- As there was heavy rush for BBM Course, it was proposed to start one more section to enable more students to join the course.

- It was proposed to improve library services through inter library loan facilities and overnight reference books services.
- The college staff and the management decided to hold job melas regularly both for NES constituent colleges and other job seeker. This would be done in association with NGO of the city and the well-known companies.
- It was proposed to encourage and activate regular activities such as N.S.S., N.C.C., sports, and cultural activities.

Achievements

- Parking facility for disabled students was provided by constructing a ramp near the class room.
- Spoken English classes, soft skill training was given to students by specialists in the field. More than 200 students were benefited.
- Diploma course in French language was offered. Prof. David Bond conducted French language classes. 40 students benefitted.
- Add on course on dramatics was conducted. 28 students benefitted.
- Sanskrit language speaking course was conducted by the Sanskrit Prof. H. Padmanabha. 18 students benefited.
- Charted Accountants Association and District Chamber of Commerce agreed to come to MOU with the institution and conduct programs benefitting stake holders from the next academic year.
- Computer lab was upgraded by installing 12 more computers. More computers were installed in the office.
- Student counselling and Health care programs were conducted by the Women Empowerment Cell.
- Teachers of the college attended state level and national level seminars and workshops. Office staff was given training to use computers in office administration.
- One more section in BBM course was started and enabled 75 students to pursue BBM degree.
- Book facility given to meritorious students was increased. Overnight reference books service was provided to students.
- International companies like Infosys, Xchanging, Cross-domain and Banks were approached and requested to conduct campus selection in the institution.
- Special emphasis to extension and community development programs such as blood donation camp, visit to villages were given importance in the N.S.S. activities 80 students donated blood. 50 N.S.S. Volunteers cleaned the premises of Rameshwara Temple at Harkere village and planted nearly 400 saplings. 200 students represented inter university sports events four girls secured places in Kuvempu University Intercollage Athletic meet for women. Student Nakul Dev K N represented National Junior Volleyball Team as captain. Our students participated and won prizes in Management festivals and cultural events conducted by other colleges.
